A Tale of Two Christmases

As December begins, it is natural that our thinking moves towards Christmas. Judging from the displays in shops and TV advertising, you might well think that Christmas has been here already for quite a while. Indeed it seems at time that there are two Christmases being celebrated at this time of year.

One Christmas seems to begin around mid-October, and focuses on the toys, gifts and food (not to mention a certain red-suited gentleman). In this Christmas, the birth of Jesus plays second fiddle to the anticipation of the presents to be left on Christmas morning; the gift of God for our salvation is not as thrilling as asking, "What's Santa bringing you?" This Christmas is largely secular; indeed God could be conveniently airbrushed from it, if desired.

But this type of Christmas is both wearying and short-lived. Wearying, in that it seems to begin earlier with every year, and short-lived, with a sense of anti-climax hitting at some point on Christmas evening or Boxing Day. Like me, you might have heard people say that Christmas is not the same when the children have grown

up. But Christmas's good news of great joy is "for all the people" (Luke 2:10), not just the children. Perhaps that feeling comes as a result of celebrating the wrong type of Christmas, or at least having the wrong focus.

The other type of Christmas enjoys the festivities, but keeps the focus on Jesus Christ. Advent is used as a season of anticipation, keeping Christmas as a time worth waiting for, reminding us of the patient faith of God's people before Christ as they waited for God's promises to come to light. This type of Christmas does not allow a follower of Jesus, St Nicolas, to eclipse the Master himself. I am amazed as how many adults are keen to talk about Santa at this time of year (usually to our daughters, not to me I hasten to add!).
